


Mark Stokes

By the time we ALIRIANS reach seniorhood, we all have stories to tell — some are worth repeating. Mark Stokes won't tell you his story. But I will.

Mark started with ALIR back when classes were being held at the Institute of Texan Cultures. When our landlord there decided the Institute needed our space, Mark, along with several other stalwarts found ALIR a new home, then they physically cleaned-up our current, long vacant building.

He taught the Socrates Cafe class for many years, and while on the Council, started the scholarship program — \$1500 for one NEISD student, now grown to \$2500 for several students, depending on donations and the committee's decisions each year.

Also, a strong advocate for the healing powers of meditation, Mark has taught meditation classes at ALIR and elsewhere.



For the past year or so, he has spent most weekday mornings walking or seated on a bench on the Riverwalk while he communes with nature and sometimes visits with other Riverwalkers. Recently, a young woman sporting a broad smile approached him and said, "Hi, I'm Andrea and I've just figured out where I know you from. Sometime back I saw you swimming in our pool at the Village at Incarnate Word."

During the ten minutes they spoke together, Mark talked about the health advantages of meditation. Andrea, the programs coordinator for residents of the Village, asked if he would be willing to help residents learn meditation. "And as your 'salary,' I'll arrange for you to have access to our heated swimming pool seven days a week." He readily accepted.

Mark has celebrated his 85th birthday. His life has been full of ups and downs as have the lives of many ALIRians. This new teaching experience and his daily wages/swimming have put a spring in his step albeit with his walker.

HELP WANTED


The **Curriculum Committee** is looking for an organized, energetic person who is interested in contributing to ALIR's learning spirit and ongoing vigor by joining the committee.

Riding the Waves of Whirls, Twirls, Curl-Cues,


OR:


