

ALIRian, Berit "Pixie" Mason was born in Greenwich Village, daughter of Random House author, Herbert M. Mason Jr. Berit's mother, Rigmor Hansen Mason, was an artist from Norway.

She grew up abroad, before her family settled in San Antonio. She attended St. Mary's Hall and Alamo Heights Independent School District Schools.

Berit attended Mary Baldwin College in Virginia, graduating from Austin College in Sherman, Texas with a B.A. in Political Science. She interned at CNN Washington at the US Supreme Court. Berit was a TV anchorreporter in Waco and San Angelo, a reporter for Texas Public Radio and WOAI 1200 AM. She was also a RIAS Berlin Commission German American Exchange Journalist.

Berit was a correspondent for the Goethe Institute, the Sons of Norway Foundation, the San Antonio Business Journal, San Antonio Report, San Antonio Woman, and the Scene in San Antonio.

She is currently secretary of the San Antonio Astronomical Association.

#### DR. JUDITH SOBRE: AN INTERVIEW


We are excited to share a special feature on one of our most cherished instructors, Dr. Judith Sobre. Judith's curiosity for learning began at a young age, always wanting to "follow the rabbit holes" of adventure. A real autodidact.

Judith loves teaching and it shows. Her teaching philosophy is simple yet profound: *make learning enjoyable*. She engages students in a relaxed environment, which fosters rich discussions and shared experiences.

One of the reasons Dr. Sobre's classes are so popular is her ability to inspire students. Her innovative approach to art history and her shift away from traditional, formal teaching styles have made her classes a favorite. Judith is a story-teller. For example, in her recent ALIR class, *Visual Culture of a Place Through Time: The Iberian Peninsula*, Judith and esteemed friend Gladys Koranek provided historical insight, architectural detail, and beautiful art photos that became an entertaining - art - culture private tour.

While attending New York University, young Judith could not see a future as a housewife on Long Island. Instead, she pondered a Masters Degree in Art History. Better yet, her wise university advisor urged and sponsored her application to Harvard. Judith's studies at Harvard and her access to its renown library inspired many scholarly articles and several books on Medieval Spanish art. At that time, the post-Spanish Civil War period had been neglected in art history studies. Her research included two years in Barcelona, while working on her dissertation. While Harvard's teaching style at the time was formal and considered by some as pompous — "they allowed me the space to work on my own and to go down my own rabbit holes".

Dr. Sobre taught at the University of Oregon for six years, then a friend informed her that the University of Texas was planning a new campus in San Antonio: UTSA. The sunshine, springtime (maybe Fiesta?) and a tremendous opportunity to design the art curriculum and department sold Judith on making the cross-country move. A creative team of 75 scholars had the university ready to open in 1975. As one of the founders of the Arts department and the Art History department, Judith pioneered the use of digital imagery in teaching. She became professor emeritus at UTSA, retiring in 2016. Along with many scholarly articles, Dr. Sobre has written several books including *San Antonio on Parade: Six Historic Festivals* (pop culture/tradition).



TEACHING IS ABOUT CREATING A COMMUNITY OF LEARNERS WHO CAN CONTRIBUTE TO EACH OTHER'S GROWTH. Sharing knowledge is one way, and Dr. Judith Sobre invites us to explore our own "rabbit holes", whether you lead a discussion on a Great Courses prepared course, design your own class, or teach with friends as a collaborative effort. 
